



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

DO YOU REMEMBER? Have you ever wondered what happened to some of our prior pastors who had ministered to the Bryan Church? Recently, a Bryan Times obituary for Mary Agnes Mason piqued my curiosity about her parents.

First of all, Mary, daughter of Herbert V. and Margarete Ruthada Johnson, grew up in Bryan. Her obituary said she was a skilled organist and planist and played bassoon in the Bryan High School Orchestra. She was also active in Girl Scouts. She first married (?) McGowen, but then later married Stuart Mason in Burlington, Indiana, in 1981. Besides her husband, she is survived by son, Vince (Gina) McGowen; grandchildren, Isabella, Sophie and Gus McGowen, of Farmington, Utah; daughters, Marissa McGowen, Kokomo, and Macey Mason, Kokomo, and <u>two sisters, Sherry (Mike)</u> <u>Penrod, Columbus, and Debbie (Denny) Williams, West Frankfort, Illinois</u>. She was a member of the Chapel Hill Christian Church, Kokomo, Indiana. She passed away on March 11, 2017.

Mary's mother, Ruthada, met Herbert while both attended Johnson Bible College, and they married on April 8, 1945 in Leipsic, Ohio, in the church where her father was minister. Ruthada was very active in our Bryan church, serving as a Girl Scout leader, a Sunday school teacher, and assisting in Herbert's ministry. She passed away on October 30, 2013 in Kokomo, Indiana, at the age of 87.

Herbert V. Johnson's ministry of more than 50 years of service, included churches in Bluff City, TN, Custer, OH, McComb, OH, <u>here in the Bryan Church for a number of years</u>, West Frankfort, IL, and Burlington, IN. In addition to his preaching ministry, he served the Boy Scouts, church camps, radio ministries community concerts, and ministerial organizations. He also gave his time serving women and children of the Howard County Children's Center, Chaplain of AA and hospitals, Elder and Sunday school teacher at Chapel Hill Christian Church in Kokomo, IN. He continued to minister to others into his 80s by conducting weddings, funerals, baptisms, and Bible studies. Herbert passed away September 3, 2014, in Kokomo, IN, at the age of 89.
